responded to the majority of your ideas and needs. The renovations provide some relief from traffic congestion and create more recreational opportunities close to home.

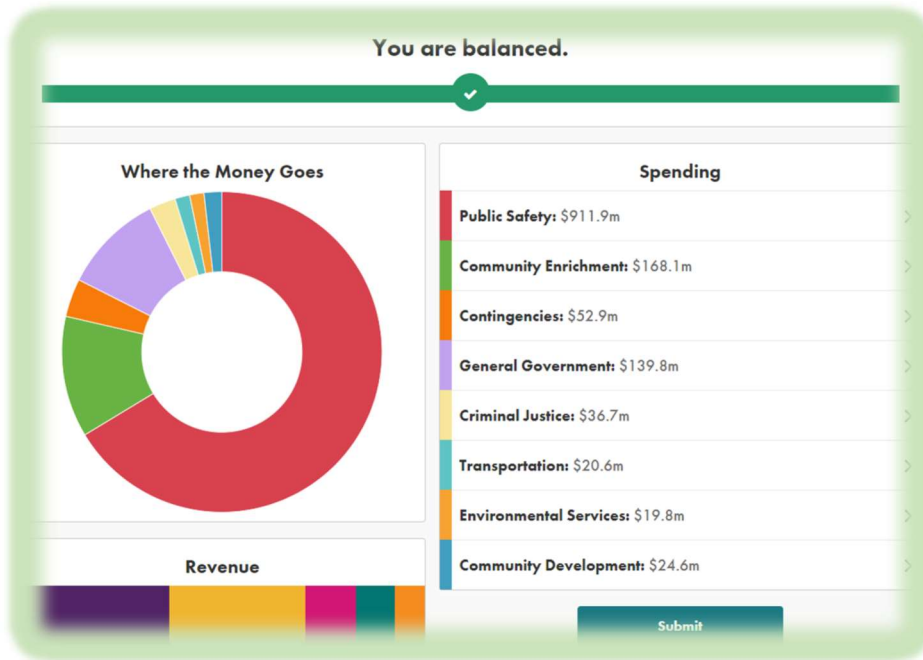
FUNDPHX LETS YOU LEARN ABOUT THE DOLLARS AND SENSE IN PHOENIX'S BUDGET



Are you interested in diving into the dollars and sense behind what makes the city of Phoenix run? Now you can learn more about all the programs and services the city provides, and what it costs to bring them to you every day.

That's possible through a new tool, called FundPHX, that takes the city's \$1.4 billion General Fund operating budget and brings it directly to your device – computer, smart phone or tablet. All the city's programs are there, with costs and descriptions, so you can learn about what it takes to provide everything from youth recreation activities to reading programs and senior services in your neighborhood.

With FundPHX you can provide comments directly on the budget, and let the city know what you think is important. You can add funding to programs you'd like to see grow, and reallocate funding from programs that you feel could be used elsewhere. Once you've made your choices, save your work, and share it with the city.

TREE PROGRAM UPDATE AND NEW DONATION PORTAL

On Jan. 7, Transportation, Infrastructure and Innovation Subcommittee approved recommendation for The Tree Program Update and New Donation Portal. City Council adopted the Tree and Shade Master Plan (Master Plan) in 2010 as a roadmap to create a healthier, more livable and prosperous 21st-century desert city. In addition to public education programs and urban forest management best practices, the plan included an ambitious goal to double the tree and shade canopy to 25 percent by 2030. Unfortunately, the effort was hindered due to funding cuts resulting from the Great Recession. Recently, the public and the City have begun to refocus efforts on the Master Plan goals alongside a growing concern about rising temperatures and the urban heat island effect - particularly in neighborhoods with both vulnerable populations and a more limited tree canopy.



In the fall of 2018, the City Council requested that the Environmental Quality and Sustainability Commission (EQSC) create a subcommittee with an initial charge to respond to recommendations from the public

regarding concerns related to tree loss. These concerns arose after the removal of a number of large trees on several highly visible commercial properties, as well as what was perceived as limited progress on the goal to double the City's tree and shade canopy. The EQSC subcommittee worked closely with Planning and Development and other City departments to identify which proposed actions could be addressed by strengthening the language of existing City ordinances and which actions would need to be addressed through a new initiative to actively manage, track and report on a citywide effort to plant trees. After working with the EQSC subcommittee, Planning and Development is planning to bring forward updates to City ordinances to support tree retention in the spring of 2020. The other recommendations of the EQSC subcommittee were brought forward to the EQSC for final review.

The final EQSC recommendations and introductory memo contain four primary recommendations:

1. Establish a commission or committee to oversee ongoing implementation of the Tree and Shade Master Plan goals;
2. Add a full-time "Tree Administrator" position to coordinate citywide efforts to manage, track and report on City-wide tree planting efforts, to apply for grants, and to seek partnerships to grow the City's tree canopy;
3. Support from Council to empower rapid and ongoing tree plantings; and
4. Support for policies that ensure that trees and shade are a primary point of consideration in the urban form.

In parallel with these activities, the Council increased the Street Transportation Department's annual operating budget by \$450,000 in fiscal year 2018 to replace trees in the right-of-way lost to storms and vehicular accidents, while Public Transit also committed to replace all trees lost in on its properties or in its areas of control on a one -



for-one basis. In addition, Office of Sustainability staff and the Volunteer Office have been developing creative ways to fund new tree planting projects to meet the 2030 goal, including: actively seeking grant funds; acquiring funding from selling carbon offsets; partnering with utilities; and seeking assistance of AmeriCorps VISTAs to work on neighborhood tree planting projects to increase the number of trees planted. The combined effort of many City departments has resulted in over 4,000 trees planted in 2019, a notable increase from prior years. Although this is more trees than any other year in the last decade, it is far short of what is needed to double the tree canopy by 2030. It is estimated that to meet the tree canopy goal, approximately 10,000 new trees need to be planted each year. The recommendations of the EQSC could help address the gap between current efforts and what is required, noting that funding for tree planting would not necessarily need to come solely from increased City budgets, but from grants, community partners and through public donations.

Formation of the Tree Donation Portal

In 2016, staff surveyed the community about the City's 2050 goals and identified remarkable public support for the tree canopy goal. Of the 1,240 respondents, 92 percent agreed with the statement that "the 25 percent

tree and shade canopy goal is a good idea." Over 50 percent of the respondents indicated that they would be willing to donate to a tree campaign. Given the strong public support, staff explored examples of other city tree donation programs and websites and found several examples including onetreeplanted.org and the National Forest Foundation's tree donation program.

The City of Phoenix has accepted public donations by check for many purposes in the past (including for trees and park benches in memory of loved ones), but the City has never had a major donation campaign specifically for trees or with the ability to accept electronic payments for these types of donations. Based on examples from other donation sites, the City has set up a donation webpage (phoenix.gov/plantatree) and worked with the Finance Department and the City's vendor, Chase Bank, to set up, at no cost, a secure electronic payment portal. The new donation portal can accept deposits and track donations into a dedicated fund from which funds can be allocated to specific projects in the following program categories:

- Tree donations designated for parks or street right of way will be transferred to the Parks and Recreation or Street Transportation department budget/cost centers, respectively, and used for specific tree planting projects selected by the Urban Forest Implementation Team (UFIT). The UFIT is a City staff committee that includes representatives from the Planning and Development, Water Services, Neighborhood Services, Parks and Recreation, and Street Transportation departments, as well as the Offices of Sustainability and Environmental Programs;
- Donations designated to neighborhoods will be administered by the Neighborhood Services department's "Love Your Block" program. Funds will be distributed monthly or quarterly to "Love Your Block" as donations become available. The "Love Your Block" program will manage the funds through a neighborhood grant program in partnership with the Citizen Forester program and the AmeriCorps VISTA program.

Although the portal allows donors to direct their donations toward any of the program areas listed, it does not allow users to select specific projects. The website includes a disclaimer indicating the City cannot guarantee when the trees will be planted, but does list recent and upcoming tree planting projects. There is also a comment box on the donation page where users can propose future projects. Individuals and organizations will also be able to apply to "Love Your Block" to receive neighborhood grants as part of the program.

Management of a New Tree Donation Program:

Initial management of the program will be led by the Office of Sustainability and the Volunteer Office, in partnership with the receiving departments listed above.

The program will accept electronic donations, from \$5 up to \$25,000, specifically for purchase and planting of trees; donations will not be used to cover administrative costs or related activities such as installing irrigation systems.



LANDLORD AND TENANT PROGRAM

Starting **January 6, 2020** Landlord and Tenant counselors will begin working out of the Travis L. Williams Family Services Center to be more accessible to the community.



The Landlord and Tenant Program provides educational services to city of Phoenix residents, and information to landlords and tenants in-person. Walk-in client hours are from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The following are recommended information to consider bringing to the counseling session:

- Leasing agreement
- Copies of all notices served by either party
- Any other documents pertaining to your landlord/tenant situation
- Proof of rental payment

Our program provides education to both landlords and tenants on their rights under the Arizona Residential Landlord and Tenant Act.

Phoenix's Landlord and Tenant Program has migrated from the Neighborhood Services Department to the Human Services Department to better align services within the community to help those who may be experiencing hardships.

The three Phoenix Family Services Centers also house eviction prevention programs and emergency funds.

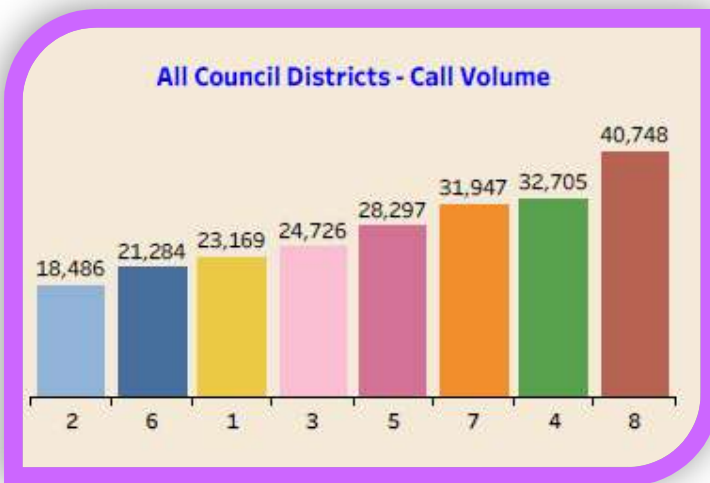
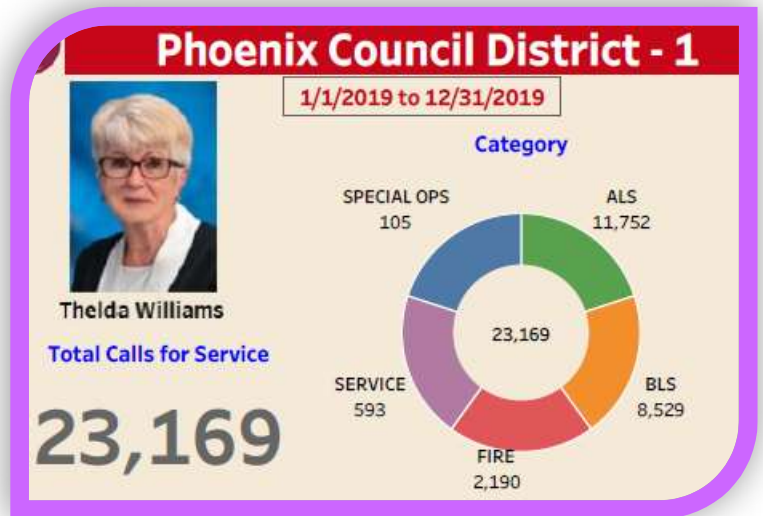

PHOENIX COUNCIL DISTRICT 1 – FIRE STATISTICS



The Phoenix Fire Department is committed to providing the highest level of public safety services to our community. We protect lives and property through fire suppression, emergency medical and transportation services, disaster services, fire prevention and public education. Our members will, **Prevent Harm, Survive, and Be Nice!**

Basic Life Support (BLS) is an emergency transport provided by certified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs). Advanced Life Support (ALS) is provided when a patient is in more critical condition and a paramedic is required to assist in the treatment of the patient before and/or during transport to the emergency facility.



ORDINANCE ADOPTION – SHORT-TERM RENTAL

Jan. 8, City Council voted and passed 8-1, to adopt an ordinance pertaining to Short-Term Rental Registry.

In 2017, Arizona State Legislature enacted Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S.) §9-500.39 which eliminates the ability for local cities and towns, including the City of Phoenix to regulate these types of rentals based solely on their classification or use. Consequently, these rentals are allowed by State law, in the City of Phoenix.

The City of Phoenix adopted an ordinance that requires owners of short-term or vacation rentals to register, provide emergency and complaint contact information. The ordinance outlines vacation rental violations, prohibited types of uses and introduces an enhanced penalty structure. (Adding section 10-193, 10-194, 10-195, 10 -196 and 10-197 to Chapter 10, Section Article XVI)

Owners and operators of short-term rentals are subject to the following:

- The owner of a short-term vacation rental must register their information and designated emergency contact person (name, address, contact information) with the City of Phoenix on a form or platform specified by the City of Phoenix.
- The online lodging operator must display the phone number and email address of the emergency contact person.
- Failure to post the following notice in a conspicuous place in the vacation rental: **NOTICE:** Using this property for following purposes are prohibited: Any nonresidential use; Holding a special event that requires a permit or license pursuant to a city or town ordinance or state law or rule; Operating a retail business, restaurant, event center, banquet hall or similar use; Housing sex offenders; Operating or maintaining a sober living home; Selling liquor, illegal drugs or pornography; Operating a nude or topless dancing; Obscenity; Adult-oriented business; or Other uses prohibited by A.R.S. 9-500.39.
- When requested by a police officer, the owner or owner's agent whose name appears on the vacation rental registration must be on the vacation rental premise, or be available over the phone or text, within 60 minutes after receiving the request. Failure for the owner or owner's agent to be on the vacation rental premise, or be available on the phone or text, within 60 minutes after receiving the request by the police officer is a violation.
- Any vacation rental owner, agent, renter, permits, facilitates, aides, or abets any violation of any provision of this Article or who fails to perform any act or duty required by this Article is subject to a civil sanction as follows: First offense, \$500; Second offense on the property within 12- month period, \$1,000 per offense; Third and subsequent offense within 12-month period, \$1,500 per offense.
- Within 30 days after a verified violation, and if required by law, the City will notify the Arizona Department of Revenues and the owner of the vacation rental of the verified violation.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

Legislative

Water Services was awarded \$200,000 from the U.S. Department of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation under the WaterSMART Water Marketing Strategy grant program. The City of Phoenix Water Department will partner with the City of Tucson and American Rivers to develop the Central Arizona Water Clearinghouse to facilitate future water market transactions and maximize use of infrastructure and storage capacity to manage water shortages.

Economic Development & Education

On Dec. 9 and 10, Aviation Staff met with personnel from Lufthansa/Eurowings to meet key airport on-boarding personnel from Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and Transportation Security Administration (TSA), partake in an airside airport tour, view leasable space and engage with prospective airline-service providers. Eurowings will start non-stop service from Phoenix to Frankfurt in April 2020.

On Dec. 10, Community and Economic Development staff facilitated a business meeting for 50 stakeholders in the Gateway Business Corridor (14th St, to 56th St., and Loop 202 to Air Lane/Airport). Staff highlighted opportunities and investments taking place in the area, promoted business connections and shared City resources.

Neighborhoods and Livability

On Dec. 19, Planning and Development staff held a fact-finding meeting for an addition of two new retail pads at Park Central Mall (3100 N. Central Ave.) along the Central Ave frontage. The first building will have 2,200 square feet of retail/restaurant and a 700-square-foot covered patio with a drive thru. The second pad will accommodate 4,800-square-foot retail space and 1,800 square foot covered patio. The development anticipates submitting construction documents in the next two months.

Social Services Delivery

On Dec. 19, Human Services staff began using a new referral system at the Family Advocacy Center. The new system automates the referrals to Victim Advocates and eliminates unnecessary data entry from staff. A new dashboard component provides current data for case management and statistics about the referrals received.

On Dec. 12, Human Services staff hosted a special utility event for members of the Pilgrim Rest Baptist Church and assisted 14 members with approximately \$8,600 of expended emergency funds.

On Dec. 19, Housing staff held the Edison-Eastlake Resident Leadership Council (RLC) 2019 Graduation. The graduation included a recap from the leadership sessions and leadership topics covered throughout the year.

On Dec. 11, Human Resources staff held orientation for Emerging Leader Class #11 with 30 participants from 14 departments. The Emerging Leader Program is designed to assist in the development of leadership skills for individual contributors who may want to become leaders or want to sharpen leadership skills that will most impact performance.

On Dec. 12, a Police Recruit Written Exam was administered on the Grand Canyon University campus to 72 applicants. Results were provided immediately following the exam and the 64 applicants that passed the Written Exam were invited to submit their AZPOST background packet. Additional Police Recruit Written Exams are scheduled for Jan. 18 and Jan. 24.

On Dec. 17, Human Resources staff participated in the West Valley Employer Outreach meeting at Neighborhood Ministries to network with community workforce partners. Staff also educated community workforce partners on the current job openings and application process with City of Phoenix.

Public Safety

On Dec. 19, Phoenix Fire staff held a firetruck display at Mary McCleod Bethune Elementary School (1310 S. 15th Ave.). Fire staff provided fire and life safety materials and meet with the public attending the event.

On Dec. 21, Phoenix Police and Fire staff hold a blood drive from 7 a.m. to noon at 5710 N. Central Ave.

Last week, Homeland Security and Emergency Management staff participated in the Arizona Statewide Election Security Tabletop Exercise (TTX) and National Governor's Association Election Security Policy Academy. The TTX scenarios covered cyberattacks, misinformation, physical attacks and other election security risks.
