MAYOR STANTON RESIGNS, PROCESS TO CALL SPECIAL ELECTION BEGINS

Phoenix Mayor Greg Stanton resigned from office at noon Tuesday, May 29. The city has begun the process to fill his vacated seat. The following explains the procedures and steps that will happen over the next few months:



Vice Mayor Thelda Williams is now serving as the city's Interim Mayor. She will also continue to serve as Councilwoman for the city's District 1. If any Phoenix resident is interested in running to replace the Mayor for the remainder of his term, he/she must declare their interest within 10 days of Stanton's resignation, which would be 5 p.m. Friday, June 8.

Next, the City Council will hold a special meeting on Monday, June 11, to appoint a Mayor Pro Tempore from remaining Councilmembers. That person will serve as Mayor, in addition to their current Council seat, until the Special Election (or, if necessary, until a runoff election).

The City Charter says the City Council must call for a Special Election between 11 and 20 days of a vacancy, while at the same time giving residents 120 days notice that an election will happen. The next available date to hold a Special Election is Tuesday, Nov. 6, 2018, which will put the vote on the state General Election.

Councilmembers:

If a current Phoenix City Councilmember chooses to run in the Special Election for Mayor, he/she will have to resign from their current position as a Councilmember. However, they do not have to resign until nomination petitions are filed. For the Nov. 6 election, petitions will be due at 5 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 8.

Any Phoenix resident interested in replacing a City Councilmember will have 10 days after the office is vacated to declare their intent to run to fill the remainder of the term of office for that Council seat. Similar to the Mayor, between 12-15 days of a Councilmember's resignation, the remaining Councilmembers will select an interim Councilmember to serve until a Special Election can be held for that office.

FRANKFURT FLIGHT SO SUCCESSFUL, CONDOR INCREASING SERVICE



Condor Airlines, which started nonstop summer service between Phoenix and Frankfurt last month, has already announced its return for 2019. Condor Airlines, part of the Thomas Cook Group, operates the route between Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport and Frankfurt Airport twice a week late May through September. The flight provides a critical link for both business and leisure travelers to and from Germany and Arizona.

Next year, flights will be extended by nearly two full months to include all of May and October, also twice per week on Mondays and Fridays.

“This direct service between Phoenix and Frankfurt provides a convenient connection for our business and leisure passengers. We’re delighted that Condor has chosen to increase service next year, and we’re looking forward to continuing the partnership that our Sky Harbor staff has worked hard to establish,” said Phoenix Mayor Thelda Williams.

Travelers wishing to connect beyond Frankfurt are finding that the flight offers a convenient and time-effective way to get to Europe and elsewhere. Condor offers service to around 90 destinations from Frankfurt. Business and leisure travelers to Germany will also find that the Frankfurt Airport serves the most destinations of any airport in the world, offering service to about 300 destinations across five continents.

The twice-weekly flight will continue to be served by a Boeing 767-300ER with more than 250 seats. Each passenger onboard receives complimentary checked baggage, beverages, meals and in-flight entertainment at each seat. The 18 seats in Business Class feature lie-flat seats, a 15” personal in-seat premium entertainment system, power and USB ports, and gourmet meals with complimentary beer, wine and cocktails.

Frankfurt is the latest new route added at Phoenix Sky Harbor. The Airport has been focused on increasing international service, including adding new Montreal service earlier this year and increased service to London on British Airways.

Phoenix Sky Harbor is a convenient gateway to destinations in the U.S. and abroad with nonstop service offered to more than 100 domestic destinations and 22 international destinations. The flight will continue to benefit the local economy, as international flights to Phoenix already bring in over \$3 billion each year. PHOENIX SKY HARBOR INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT COMPREHENSIVE ASSET MANAGEMENT PLAN (CAMP)

The Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport Comprehensive Asset Management Plan (CAMP) is a 20-year plan for airport facilities, infrastructure and land development. The planning process is anticipated to take approximately 18-months to complete and culminates with City Council approval and submission to the FAA. The last PHX long range plan update occurred in 2010. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) requires airport plans to be fully updated every 7-10 years.

The CAMP will address major planning issues such as the 24th Street and Buckeye Road transportation systems, facilities and land development; aeronautical business and transit oriented development planning; and modernization of core facilities such as tenant operations, security, facility maintenance and utilities.

City of Phoenix Reinvests to Protect Water Supplies

Phoenix City Council this week approved a three-year agreement with the National Forest Foundation (NFF) to aide in the ongoing protection of Phoenix's water supply, and the health of Salt and Verde Rivers watersheds.

Through this innovative partnership, originating in 2015, the City of Phoenix will continue to invest \$200,000 annually in the Northern Arizona Forest Fund (NAFF). The NAFF is a program developed by the NFF and the Salt River Project (SRP) that improves forest health and water quality in the Salt and Verde River watersheds. Phoenix was the first municipality to partner with the NFF on this effort.

"We must continue to protect and preserve the watersheds that our city and the surrounding metropolitan area rely upon," said Phoenix Mayor Thelda Williams. "The continuation of this partnership with the National Forest Foundation is a sensible and smart approach for the City of Phoenix."

The National Forests in northern Arizona provide most of the water to the Salt and Verde Rivers, which are vital surface water supplies to downstream users in the greater Phoenix metropolitan areas. The City of Phoenix obtains roughly one-half of its raw water supply from these watersheds. Past forest management practices have created conditions that challenge the health of Arizona's forests and the sustainability and quality of the state's water supplies.

As the congressionally-chartered nonprofit partner of the U.S. Forest Service, the NFF is uniquely positioned to implement projects across the Salt and Verde Watersheds that reduce erosion and sedimentation, restore wetlands, meadows and springs, and reduce fire risk. The City of Phoenix participates in funding these projects to improve watershed health and support the delivery of clean, reliable water supplies.

"We are thrilled that the City of Phoenix is continuing to support the Northern Arizona Forest Fund and its measurable on-the-ground accomplishments, demonstrating its foresight and commitment to protecting the water resources we all depend upon," said Rebecca Davidson, NFF's Director of the Southern Rockies Field Program.

For more than three years, the Northern Arizona Forest Fund has actively improved the City of Phoenix's watersheds. Prescribed burns, forest thinning, trail/road improvement, and spring/wetland/meadow restoration projects in the Apache-Sitgreaves, Tonto, Kaibab, Coconino and Prescott National Forests have collectively produced positive water quality impacts since 2015. Highlights include:

- 21 restoration projects
- Over 11,000 acres of fuels reduction projects
- Over 2,500 acres of stream, spring and wetland protection
- Over 130 miles of erosion control and drainage improvements
- Over 4,000 native trees and shrubs planted

This year, the NAFF is completing six watershed protection projects within the Salt and Verde watersheds, which will be funded in part by the City of Phoenix.

New Fines for Prostitution Cases Will Benefit Human Trafficking Victims

The City Council unanimously approved an ordinance that imposes new fees for soliciting prostitution on offenders who have been convicted more than once. Because there is often a link between prostitution and human trafficking, resources collected from the fines will be used to benefit victims.

"Phoenix is committed to being a leader in combatting human trafficking," said Mayor Thelda Williams. "Today's actions toughen penalties for Johns and help those who have been victims of sex trafficking."

Under the amended city code, a \$2,000 fee will now be imposed for a second conviction, \$2,250 for a third conviction, and \$2,500 for each subsequent conviction. The fees imposed on convicted offenders will be directed toward the newly established City of Phoenix Anti-Human Trafficking Fund that will benefit Starfish Place, the nation's first long-term housing project for victims of human trafficking that opened last year.

"Prostitution solicitation and human trafficking continue to be a worldwide tragedy," said Councilman Jim Waring, chair of the Phoenix Human Trafficking Task Force. "Phoenix is committed to having the toughest possible penalties imposed on those who abuse victims in our city."

Last year, 15 Phoenix Police operations involved buyers of sex. From these operations, 64 men were arrested. Phoenix police also conducted a store front massage parlor operation, which resulted in an additional 86 arrests as part of the massage parlor “sting.”

Also in 2017, the Vice Unit rescued 62 juveniles who were victims of human trafficking. Although cases with juveniles are not prosecuted in the misdemeanor system, the number of juveniles rescued demonstrates the enormity and tragedy of human trafficking.

Those convicted for the first time of soliciting sex acts from other adults are required to spend 15 days in jail and complete a court-ordered education and treatment program. Mandatory jail time increases to 30, 60, and 180 days for second, third and fourth convictions, respectively.

Many defendants are eligible for a diversion program for a first-time arrest for soliciting prostitution. Defendants are responsible for paying the \$800 fee for the class. The class teaches, among other topics, the ways that prostitution harms the defendant, the person solicited and the community.

The court may also impose jail costs for anyone booked into jail or serving a jail sentence. Currently, the court may impose a fine of up to \$2,500 for each conviction, but is not required to do so.

The mild Spring weather has officially ended as temperatures creep up above 100 degrees. Phoenix averaged more than 100 days in the triple digits last year. With the expected return of the heat, the city of Phoenix has launched the third annual “We’re Cool” Heat Relief cooling and hydration centers campaign. The campaign promotes locations that have been designated “We’re Cool – Heat Relief Network” spots throughout Phoenix and offers free bottles of water and indoor locations to cool off.

The aim is to increase awareness about public cooling refuges and hydration stations, especially among low-income transit users, homeless and transient populations, and other vulnerable groups. The “We’re Cool” campaign is part of the Heat Relief Network, a partnership between the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG), municipalities, nonprofit organizations and faith-based communities that provide refuge from the extreme Arizona heat for those in need.

In addition to activating the hydration and cooling stations, the city of Phoenix Human Services Department is soliciting donations to stock the “We’re Cool” locations through the next five months. SAFETY REMINDER - Never leave a child, or pet inside an unattended vehicle!

A lot can happen at 160 degrees Fahrenheit: Eggs fry, salmonella bacteria dies, and human skin will suffer third-degree burns. The dashboard of a car on a hot summer day can hit about 160 degrees in about an hour. In the same hour, a child inside a hot car could suffer heat injury or die. CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

Neighborhoods and Livability

On May 21, the Irish Cultural Center hosted the Margaret T. Hance Park Open House, which was an opportunity for the public to review and provide feedback on the new design concepts of the revitalization project for the park. Approximately 200 people attended the event, with over 70 individuals providing feedback, with the majority being positive and encouraging the project to move forward.

On May 26-28, the Parks and Recreation Aquatics team opened 28 of the City's 29 swimming pools for Memorial Day weekend, with nearly 15,000 in attendance for the opening weekend. Unfortunately, El Prado Pool was closed due to fire damage but is being repaired quickly. The pools will re-open for summer swim on June 4. Aquatic swim season will run for eight weeks, with a variety of special events and programs at different pool locations throughout the summer.

Planning and Development staff granted preliminary approval to a development consisting of 89 single-family detached, and duplex rental units called Avilla Paseo on the southeast corner of 35th Avenue and Deer Valley Road. The project will have private onsite water and sewer systems and staff suggested a separate meeting with the Water Services department to develop a looping system for each with connections to both 35th Avenue and Deer Valley Road.

Social Services Delivery

Staff assisted 125 customers with homeless related concerns as follows: 93 calls, 23 PAYS reports, 8 e-mails and one after-hours voice mails.

A total of 883,512 bottles of water have been distributed to the community to date. Human Services staff presented to Bank of America on the City's heat relief initiative.

Infrastructure

On May 24, the Federal Aviation Administration implemented Step 1B of the Joint Petition and thereby completed returning the west departures to their approximate historical locations, including the southwesterly Laveen route changes which had been delayed to ensure completion of tribal review of environmental impacts.

On May 22, Aviation hosted the mandatory bidders' conference with a total of 65 attendees. The procurement is to select no more than four qualified firms to provide proposals for either a Parking Concession and/or Hotel Development at Sky Harbor Airport. As a result of the meeting, a total of 13 teams submitted their formal Intent to Submit. Proposals are due June 28.

On May 25, Public Transit staff presented at a South Central Light Rail Extension Business Outreach meeting held at the South Mountain Community Center. City staff presented an overview of the project as well as information on the business assistance and land planning service aspects of the recently awarded TOD grant. Valley Metro (VM) staff presented on the additional business assistance to be provided during construction. The meeting had 40-50 attendees, including agency staff, business owners, and other interested parties along the corridor.

Public Transit staff attended the Cactus Park Community Alliance neighborhood meeting together with Phoenix Police and Valley Metro staff. The City and Valley Metro provided an overview of the Metro Center extension project and status planned security improvements. Staff also answered questions regarding bus stops and plans for shade, the T2050 plan, regional Dial-a-Ride operations, and the I-10 West LRT corridor.

On June 21 at 6:30 p.m., Street Transportation staff are scheduled to meet with residents of the Dove Valley Ranch Community Association at the Foothills Community Foundation. Staff will discuss traffic calming options and provide information about pavement maintenance.

On May 22, Street Transportation staff met with 15 residents of the Coronado (East) Neighborhood group to discuss concerns about speeding and to answer questions about the process to install No Parking signs.

On June 4, the City Hall Elevator Modernization project for 11 units will commence. Two elevators will be removed from service at a time (one high-rise and one low-rise), until the project is complete. The project is expected to take approximately 20 months to complete.

On May 12, Public Works gave out approximately 168 cubic yards, of certified compost to Phoenix residents at Steele Indian School Park. A total of 163 residents participated. Residents were allowed to scoop as much compost as they needed and could fit into their vehicles. Attendees shared appreciation of the high-quality compost. The give-away celebrated the one-year anniversary of the City's Composting Facility and final day of the US Composting Council's International Compost Awareness Week.

On May 15, staff from Water Services and Parks and Recreation met to discuss Rio Salado maintenance issues and to view potential sites for future sandblasted artwork to convey stormwater pollution prevention messaging. Two bridges along the trail are ideal for the bilingual messaging and are examples of City infrastructure that discharges stormwater into the Salt River. This project will help the City meet annual MS4 permit public education and outreach goals.

CHILDREN'S FEEDING PROGRAMS

St. Mary's Food Bank's Kids Cafe partners with over 100 sites offering meals through-out the day, through-out the valley during the entire summer. One in three children in Arizona lives in poverty and is at risk of going to bed hungry tonight. Arizona ranks 47th out of 50 states in the number of children who may not know where their next meal is coming from. Our vision is to see that no child goes to bed hungry, so they can live healthy and productive lives. In response to these needs, St. Mary's Food Bank operates programs that fight child hunger, including Kids Cafe® and the Backpack Program.

Kids Cafe®

This meal-service program provides Arizona children with what is often their last meal of the day. We currently collaborate with schools, community centers, health clinics, and other neighborhood groups to provide free, healthy meals daily in after-school programs as well as during the summer. In addition to the nutritious meals, these programs provide a safe environment for children through enrichment activities such as recreation or tutoring. Kids Cafe® provides 6,000 meals daily, including 1,000 hot meals, at more than 130 sites throughout Arizona.

Backpack Program

St. Mary's Food Bank's Backpack Program works with community partners to identify chronically hungry children and provide them with a weekly food bag to help their families through the weekend. Backpacks are filled with non-perishable ingredients that provide at least three nutritious meals to a family of four. Backpacks can serve as a means of providing direct assistance to families in rural areas, or to those with limited transportation options. We currently collaborate with more than 70 schools and community centers to provide about 2,000 backpacks per week to families across the state.
