

Motorists who illegally park in a spot designated for people with disabilities could be taking away a space from someone who really needs it. Violators face fines ranging from \$288 to \$480.

ow-interest federal disaster loans are available to Arizona residents and business owners affected by the severe storms and flooding that occurred Sept. 8, 2014, in Maricopa County.

The disaster declaration makes U.S. Small Business Administration assistance available in Maricopa County and neighboring counties.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure website at https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela.

The filing deadline to return applications for property damage is Dec. 1. The deadline to return economic injury applications is July 2, 2015.

Volunteers are needed for the upcoming tax season. The Internal Revenue Service in partnership with the city of Phoenix will be conducting free training sessions from November to January at locations around the city.

Last year, volunteers helped prepare thousands of returns resulting in millions of dollars to Phoenix residents. One hour of volunteer time may be worth more than \$1,800 to a working family.

Phoenix receives \$1.6 million grant for South Central Transit Corridor

The city is pleased that it will receive a \$1.6 million grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation for the South Central Transit Corrridor.

The grant funds will be used to support planning, environmental assessment and conceptual engineering for the transit corridor, a five-mile light rail line along Central Avenue between downtown Phoenix and Baseline Road. Recent studies of the area indicated 14 percent of residents walk or bike to work, and more than 56 percent come from households with no available automobile.

The grant was awarded as part of the U.S. Department of Transportation's TIGER (Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery) program.

Household Hazardous Waste event set for Esteban Park

The Public Works Department has scheduled a Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) event from 7 a.m. to noon Friday and Saturday, Dec. 5 – 6, at Esteban Park, 3345 E. Roeser Road.

HHW events are for Phoenix residential solid waste customers only. Proof of city of Phoenix solid waste service is required, so please bring your current city of Phoenix city services bill showing solid waste fees and a matching photo ID. In addition:

- Non-hazardous materials brought to events will be sorted and disposed of as municipal solid waste.
- No commercial loads, large residential quantities, medical waste, explosives or radioactive waste will be accepted.
- A maximum of five tires per resident will be accepted. No tractor or oversize tires will be allowed.

Mark your calendar for the next 'I Recycle Phoenix' festival

ere's another chance to recycle your used household items and electronics to make room for the new ones you received for the holidays.

The "I Recycle Phoenix" festival will be 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 3, at Christown-Spectrum Mall, 1703 W. Bethany Home Road. At this "recycle-palooza," you can bring old laptops and electronics, phone books and writing utensils, rechargeable and old batteries, ink jet cartridges, clothing and small appliances and holiday decor.

Residents also may shred documents (up to five boxes) and computer hard drives at the event.

Household hazardous waste items, such as tires, oil-based paints and chemicals, will not be accepted at this event. A \$5 fee will be charged for each CRT monitor (bulky computer monitors) and \$10 for each CRT TV (tube).

Here's a guide to recycling holiday wrapping paper

fter all the presents have been opened, are you left wondering what wrapping paper can and cannot be recycled?



Most holiday wrappers and greeting cards can be placed in your blue recycling containers, but there are exceptions. The following cards and wrapping materials should not be placed in your recycling bins:

- Foil embossed papers
- Plastic wrap (from gift baskets)
- Ribbons or bows
- Materials with glitter

Wrap presents with reused gift bags and wrappers or get creative with craft paper, newspapers and comics pages.
