Earned Income Tax Credit campaign assists families

The Human Services Department has launched its annual Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) campaign, which offers free tax preparation at 15 Phoenix sites.

The campaign helps low- and moderate-income working families who earned less than \$53,000 in 2014 with free tax-filing that enables them to receive an EITC tax credit up to \$6,143.

A list of Phoenix sites, including hours and days of operation, is available at phoenix.gov/eitc.

Taxpayers must bring a picture ID for themselves and spouse; Social Security cards and/or Individual Tax Identification Number cards for all household members; proof of income, including W-2s and 1099 Retirement Income; information for other income; 1095-A verification of medical insurance premium tax credit; verification of all other deductions/credits; and the amount paid to child care provider (if applicable). If filing jointly, both adults must be present to sign the return.

Digital cities survey ranks Phoenix in top 10

The Center for Digital Government, a national research and advisory institute on information technology policies and best practices in state and local government, ranked Phoenix in the top 10 in its annual Digital Cities Survey for its technology initiatives and projects.

Phoenix received recognition in the 250,000 or more population category, tying with Long Beach, Calif., for sixth

place. The city was awarded the top-ten ranking based on the redesign of phoenix.gov, online transparency, cybersecurity education and other initiatives.

Public Works can collect your green organics

f your property has lush vegetation or if you do yard maintenance every week, then the Green Organics Curbside Collection could be the service for you.

For an additional \$5 a month per requested container, customers receive a large tan container for yard waste such as tree branches, leaves, grass clippings and untreated wood. The tan containers will be collected on the same day as your trash and recycling containers. The green organics waste will be processed into mulch.

Materials not accepted for the green organics program are palm fronds, oleanders, creosote and treated wood. The Green Organics Curbside Collection service is not a composting program, therefore food waste should not be placed in the tan containers.

public safety is the number one priority for the city of Phoenix, and the individuals behind the badge are some of the top police officers in the country...people like Police Commander Lisa Ruggiero.

Commander Ruggiero grew up in Tucson and the Bronx, N.Y., and is the first in her family to choose law enforcement as a career. A 24-year veteran of the Phoenix Police Department, she

spent many years on patrol working directly with the community and is currently in charge of the Desert Horizon Precinct.

Commander Ruggiero is passionate about safety and devoted last month educating the public about Shannon's Law and pedestrian safety. Shannon's Law was passed after the 1999 death of 14-year-old Shannon Smith, who was in the backyard of her central Phoenix home when a bullet fell from the sky, striking her in the head.

As for pedestrian safety, Commander Ruggiero noted that accidents often occur when motorists fail to yield for pedestrians in crosswalks and when pedestrians cross mid-block or disregard safety around bus stops and the light rail. "We want to impress upon people to be safe all year round," Commander Ruggiero says.

Repairing leaky toilets can save money

leaky toilet can quietly waste hundreds of gallons of water each week, which is why it is important to check for leaks.

To find out if your toilet is leaking, put a few drops of food coloring in your toilet tank. Do not flush. If after 15 minutes you have colored water in the toilet bowl, it indicates a worn-out seal around the flapper is leaking water from the tank to the bowl. Replace the flapper to stop the leak. This easy fix can save more than 600 gallons of water a month.
