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## Voting in the city of Phoenix

### Who Can Vote?

To vote in a city election, you must be at least 18 years old, be registered to vote within Maricopa County and a resident of the city for at least 29 days before the election.

### When Are City Elections?

The Mayoral and City Council elections are usually held on the first Tuesday in September in odd-numbered years. If a candidate does not receive a majority vote, runoff elections are held the first Tuesday in November between the two candidates receiving the most votes.

### Voter Registration Forms

Voter registration forms are available in the City Clerk Department and Phoenix City Hall lobby, both located at 200 W. Washington St. and at governmental facilities throughout the city. ### Early Voting 602-261-VOTE (8683)

Any voter may cast an early ballot either by mail or at an early voting location. If you are on the permanent early voting list and have not notified the City Clerk that you do not wish to receive a ballot for the election, or if you requested an early ballot by mail, the ballot will be mailed to you about three to four weeks before the Election. If you wish to receive an early ballot by mail, and are not on the permanent early voting list, request forms are available at phoenix.gov and at city public service counters and libraries about 90 days before the election.

Request forms also can be obtained by calling the City Clerk Department. The City Clerk must receive a signed, written request for an early ballot by mail no later than 5:00 p.m. on the second Friday before the election. Voted early ballots must be received by the City Clerk no later than 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.

Voters who wish to vote early but do not request an early ballot by mail may vote early in person on the 15th Floor of Phoenix City Hall, 200 W. Washington St., from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, at least 15 days before the election. Additional early voting locations may be designated. A list of these locations and the voting hours of each are available at phoenix.gov at least 90 days before the election or by calling the City Clerk Department. The last day to vote an early ballot at these designated early voting locations is the Friday before the election.

**Accessible Voting 602-261-VOTE (8683)**

The City Clerk Department will provide the Sample Ballot and Publicity Pamphlet in alternative formats, including Braille, large print, audio-tape and compact disc (CD), upon request. Accessible voting devices that permit voters with various disabilities to vote independently are available at the early voting locations.

**Election Workers 602-495-CITY (2489)**

Elections would prove to be an impossible task without the assistance of residents. To be an Election Board worker for the city of Phoenix, you must be a registered voter residing in the city of Phoenix at least 29 days before the scheduled City Election.

**Which Precinct Do I Live In? (see Appendix A – Other Forms of Government)**

**Where Do I Go To Vote?**

About five weeks before each City election, a Sample Ballot and Publicity Pamphlet is mailed to each registered voter. The Pamphlet identifies your polling place name and address on the back cover. About 90 days before the election a polling place locator is available on the Internet at [phoenix.gov](http://phoenix.gov). You can enter your residence address and the locator will provide the name and address of your polling place and a map showing the location.

**Initiative, Referendum and Emergency Clause****Initiative**

The qualified electors of Phoenix shall have the power through the initiative to enact legislation to carry out or enforce the general powers of the city or of the City Council. City Charter Chapter XV.

An initiative is a proposal by qualified electors for new legislation. To be valid, an initiative must be supported by a petition signed by a number of qualified electors equal to 15 percent of the total number of votes cast at the last election at which a Mayor was elected. When an initiative petition is valid, the City Council must adopt the proposed measure or refer it to the voters for their approval or rejection. If the proposed measure is a City Charter amendment the Council cannot adopt it directly, so they must refer it to the voters.

### **Referendum**

The qualified electors of Phoenix shall have the power through the referendum to refer to the people a protest, demand for reconsideration, or repeal of legislation to carry out or enforce the general powers of the city or of the City Council. City Charter Chapter XVI.

The Arizona Constitution and the City Charter reserve to the people the power of referendum. A referendum is a proposal by qualified electors to repeal a measure adopted by the City Council. Any measure, except an emergency measure, that the Council of the city of Phoenix adopts may be subject to the power of referendum. To allow for the exercise of the power of referendum, no measure adopted by the City Council, except an emergency measure, may go into effect until 30 days after its adoption. During the 30 days, the qualified electors may collect signatures on a referendum petition demanding repeal of the measure. To be valid, a referendum must be supported by a petition signed by a number of qualified electors equal to 10 percent of the total number of votes cast at the last election at which a Mayor was elected.

If a referendum petition is filed within the 30-day period, the measure that is subject to the referendum is kept from going into effect while the referendum process is under way. If the referendum petition is insufficient, the referendum fails and the measure would go into effect immediately. If the referendum petition is sufficient, the City Council must repeal the measure or refer it to the voters for their approval or rejection. If the measure is approved by the voters it would go into effect immediately. If the measure is rejected by the voters it would never go into effect. For information, call 602-262-6837.

### **Emergency Clause**

There is an exception to the referendum power that allows the City Council, by a three-quarters vote (seven of the nine members), to declare that an emergency exists making it necessary for a measure to become effective immediately. When the City Council determines a measure must take effect immediately, the measure must state in a separate section why it must be effective immediately. This section is known as the emergency clause.

The emergency clause says that if the City Council declares an emergency exists making it necessary for the measure to become effective immediately, and thereby makes the measure effective as soon as it is adopted, if it receives seven or more votes from the City Council. The use of the emergency clause expressly exempts the measure from the referendum. The City Council's decision to use the emergency clause to make a measure effective immediately is considered final because the courts have held that reasons for using the emergency clause are solely within the discretion of the City Council and are not subject to review by the courts. ## Committees and Boards

### Citizens' Bond Executive Committee

Develops and submits for voter approval a bond package that prioritizes and addresses the most important capital needs in the city of Phoenix for the next decade. 40 members appointed for the duration of the committee.

### Airport Board of Adjustment

Hears and make decisions, interpret meanings and words, in those matters pertaining to the Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport Zoning Ordinance. Five members appointed to three-year terms.

### Airport Zoning Commission

Holds public hearings where necessary and makes recommendations to the Council on all matters concerning or relating to the creation of various zones, boundaries thereof, appropriate regulations to be enforced therein, amendments of this ordinance, and any other matter within the scope of the police power. Members consist of the current Phoenix Planning Commission.

### Architectural Appeals Board

Has the powers and duties to hear specific items appealed by the development review applicant contesting design review decisions affiliated with architectural diversity standards applied by the Development Services Department. Three members appointed to two-year terms.

### Audit Committee

Oversees and provides policy guidance to the City Auditor Department. Executes contracts with one or more certified public accountants who are not employees of the city to conduct independent audits of the city's comprehensive annual financial report and the federal single audit and review the results of the independent audits. Advises Council regarding the status of contracts to conduct

independent audits. Reviews and approves the City Auditor Department's annual audit plan. Recommends audits of departments, offices, and programs to the Council. Nine members appointed to varied terms.

**Board of Adjustment** (see *Planning Department*)

**Citizens' Transit Commission**

Established as provided for in Proposition 2000 to assure public input and government accountability on all transit and city traffic improvements that are made with funding provided pursuant to that measure. Fifteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**City Tourism and Hospitality Advisory Board**

Evaluate and recommend to the City Council projects to be funded for the hospitality industry's share of surplus arena tax funds. Projects will enhance the tourism and hospitality industry in Phoenix, subject to fiscal constraints and criteria imposed by the city. Fourteen members appointed to two-year terms.

**Civil Service Board**

Prescribe, amend and enforce rules for classified service that have the force and effect of law after review and approval by City Council, and hear appeals on disciplinary cases. Five members appointed to three-year terms. Phoenix residency required.

**Commission on Housing and Neighborhoods**

Addresses issues affecting housing and neighborhood preservation issues in Phoenix and the roles of both the private and public sector in housing and neighborhood preservation issues. This Commission will submit reports to the City Council on such issues and make recommendations for city action, and will act as an advocate with respect to housing and neighborhood preservation issues. Fifteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**Community Development Review Committee**

Conducts a request for proposals process and makes recommendations to City Council for the allocation of federal Community Development Block Grant funds in the categories of Public Services and Public Facilities. Eleven members appointed to two-year terms.

**Deferred Compensation Plan Trust Board**

Serve as administrator of the Deferred Compensation Plan for city of Phoenix employees and determine investment of accounts and emergency payments to plan members. Nine members appointed to four-year terms.

**Design Review Appeals Board**

**Design Review Standards Committee**

(see *Planning Department*)

**Development Advisory Board**

Reviews and advises the City Council on development processes; makes recommendations to the City Council for updating building and safety codes; hears appeals from the decision of the Building Official and hears appeals from the decisions of the City Manager’s representative. Twenty-six members appointed to three-year terms.

**Environmental Quality Commission**

Advises the City Council and makes recommendations on policy issues to preserve and improve the environmental quality of Phoenix and the region. Fifteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**Fire Safety Advisory Board**

Hears appeals from the decisions of the Fire Marshal, and recommends revisions to the Fire Prevention Code to the Chief of the Fire Department. Thirteen members appointed to four-year terms.

**Health Care Benefits Trust Board**

Administers the Health Care Benefits Trust Fund for the purpose of providing direct payment of the Health Care Benefits Plan for the benefit of participants. Participants are benefit-eligible City employees, elected officials, retirees, eligible dependents, or others determined to be eligible to participate in the Health Care Benefits Plan. Five board members are appointed by the City Manager to varying terms. Four of the five board members are citizen members with experience in the fields of finance, insurance, employment benefits or health care. (Ordinance No. G-5016).

**Healthier Initiative Ad Hoc Committee**

**Heritage Commission**

Reviews operating policies for the park tenants and recommends policies for City Council adoption and oversees implementation of these policies. Nine members appointed to three-year terms.

**Historic Preservation Commission**

Develops, maintains and amends as needed, a plan for historic preservation; reviews proposed alterations to historic properties, historic districts and archeological resources through the certificate of appropriateness process. Nine members appointed to three-year terms.

**Human Relations Commission**

Encourages mutual respect and understanding among all groups and discourages all manner and manifestation of discrimination through educational programs and public awareness campaigns. Seventeen members appointed to three-year terms.

**Human Services Commission**

Established in 1964, the Human Services Commission is composed of elected and appointed public officials or their representatives, representatives of low-income residents and community organizations. The 28-member commission is appointed by the Mayor and City Council and serves as the Community Action Advisory

Board in Phoenix. Commissioners work toward the prevention and elimination of poverty by increasing community awareness of the needs of the poor and advocating for policies and programs designed to assist low-income individuals and families.

**Industrial Development Authority Board**

Promotes industry and develops trade in the Phoenix area; assists – financially and otherwise – in the rehabilitation, expansion and development of all kinds of businesses and industries that will promote and assure job opportunities. Nine members appointed to six-year terms.

**Judicial Selection Advisory Board**

Encourages qualified individuals to apply for the office of Judge of the Phoenix Municipal Court; conducts investigations into the background and qualification of candidates and submits to the City Council recommendations for appointment or reappointment to the Office of Judge of the Phoenix Municipal Court. Seven members appointed to three-year terms.

**Library Advisory Board**

Informs and advises the City Council on matters of public interest and need in relation to the resources and services of the Phoenix Public Library System. Seven members appointed to three-year terms.

**License Appeals Board**

Conducts hearings and makes final decisions regarding the suspension or revocation of regulatory licenses. Seven members appointed to four-year terms.

**Maricopa County Sports Authority**

Established by the County Board of Supervisors. Under the enabling legislation approved by the State Legislature. Phoenix has three representatives on the board.

**Mayor’s Commission on Disability Issues**

Reviews local, regional and national disability programs and recommends those exhibiting demonstrated worth for implementation or promotion by the city of Phoenix; makes recommendations to the City Council on any issues or concerns to people with disabilities. Twenty-one members appointed to three-year terms.

**Military Veteran Affairs Commission**

Provides recommendations to the City Council on all matters pertaining to the affairs of military veterans residing in Phoenix. 15 members appointed to three-year terms.

**Neighborhood Block Watch Oversight Committee**

Solicits, evaluates and recommends to the City Council appropriate proposals to expend funds for the expansion of Block Watch programs within the constraints imposed by the Neighborhood Protection Ordinance. Twenty members appointed to two-year terms.

**Pacific Rim Advisory Council**

Promotes, fosters and enhances trade, cultural and educational relationships with the city of Phoenix and Pacific Rim countries; act as a vehicle of communication between state, county and local governments and the Asian community. Twenty-one members appointed to four-year terms.

**Parks and Preserve Initiative Oversight Committee**

Annually reviews the expenditures of the Phoenix Parks and Preserve Initiative Program for conformance to the September, 1999 Ballot. Consults with the Parks and Recreation Board, Citizens Bond Committee, and advise the City Council on the Parks and Preserve Initiative Program. Five members appointed to three-year terms.

**Parks and Recreation Board**

Establishes operating policies for park facilities; advises the City Council on parks and recreation needs; monitors the Mountain Preserves program and act as trustee for all gifts. Eight members appointed to five-year terms.

**Phoenix Arts and Culture Commission**

Protects, enhances and advocates excellence in the arts; raise residents' awareness of and involvement in the arts; establishes policies of inclusion of art in public work; encourages development of the arts community and art industry. At least eighteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Aviation Advisory Board**

Makes recommendations to City Council on airport policies, projects, concession contracts and leases. Eleven members appointed to four-year terms.

**Phoenix Citizens Corps Committee**

As a part of the USA Freedom Corp, the Citizens Corps was created to help coordinate volunteer activities that will make communities safer, stronger and better prepared to respond to any emergency situation. Ten members appointed to two-year terms.

**Phoenix Civic Improvement Corporation Board**

Established to finance and construct certain public improvements in and for the city of Phoenix, in order to sell the same to said City. Six members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Commission on the Economy**

Advises the City Council on matters pertaining to the development of a vital Phoenix economy. Phoenix residency required. Fourteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Employment Relations Board**

Serves as a neutral authority in resolution of unfair employee practice charges; establishes rules and regulations by which negotiations shall be conducted; promotes improvement of employer/employee relations. Phoenix residency required. Five members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Pride Commission**

Fosters a sense of community pride and good will among Phoenix and Valley residents; improves the internal and external perception of Phoenix; educates residents about the cultural diversity of Phoenix. Nineteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Residential Investment Development Effort**

Created in 1989 to assist in the community's efforts to provide affordable housing within the Phoenix corporate limits. The corporation was organized to pursue development or acquisition opportunities that will promote or increase the supply of housing that is affordable to low and moderate income households. Four members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Substance Abuse Prevention Commission**

Advises and provides recommendations to the City Council on matters pertaining to substance abuse prevention within the city of Phoenix. Thirty-five members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Women's Commission**

Provides advocacy and consultation on economic, political and social issues facing women; defines concerns of women and explores resolutions; promotes the participation of women in civic and public affairs; coordinates various community activities and special projects. Eighteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Workforce Connection**

Provides policy and program oversight of the Local Workforce Investment System in accordance with the Workforce Investment Act of 1998. Thirty-five members appointed to three-year terms.

**Phoenix Youth and Education Commission**

Reviews, local, regional and national educational issues and recommends the implementation or promotion of those approaches that show the greatest promise for the enhancement of the quality of education within the City. Thirty-four members appointed to varied terms.

**Planning Commission** *(see pg. 139)***Public Defender Review Committee**

Serve in an advisory capacity for matters relating to delivery of public defender services in the city of Phoenix. Seven members appointed to four-year terms.

**Public Safety Personnel Retirement System Board**

Provide an equitable program for public safety personnel who are regularly assigned hazardous duty. Seven members appointed to four-year terms.

**Rehabilitation Appeals Board**

Hear and make judgments on appeals of the Neighborhood Preservation Ordinance. Nine members appointed to three-year terms.

**Sister Cities Commission**

Encourage cultural, economic and educational exchanges between Phoenix and its seven sister cities; coordinate celebration of national or regional festivals; advise the City Council on international matters. Twenty-five members appointed to three-year terms.

**Spending Limit Task Force**

Charged to review the effects of the state spending limitation on the city of Phoenix. Seven members appointed to varied terms.

**Surface Transportation Advisory Committee**

Study street conditions and advise the City Council on methods for street improvement; review the Six-Year Major Street Program; propose changes in street policies; review and make recommendations on city budget relative to total city street programs. Sixteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**U.S.S. Phoenix Commission**

Raise the level of awareness of Phoenix residents of the activities of the U.S. Navy; provide information to the crew and officers of the Navy about the city of Phoenix. Eighteen members appointed to three-year terms.

**West Phoenix Revitalization Community Advisory Board**

Advise and provide recommendations to the City Council on all matters pertaining to the revitalization of West Phoenix. Seventeen members appointed to three-year terms.

**Workforce Connections Youth Initiatives Committee**

Advices the Phoenix Workforce Connection on all job-related training program related to youth. Fifteen members appointed to a one-year term.

**Early Citizen Involvement Program**

In March 1990, the Mayor and City Council implemented the Early Citizen Involvement Program. For all new Capital Improvement Program projects, public meetings are held to provide information about the project, and seek citizen input before site selection and design. Additionally, notification is provided prior to project construction.

Capital Improvement Program projects are posted on the Phoenix "CityPage," which appears every Friday in the Valley & State section of the Arizona Republic.

**Fire and Life Safety** – Installs smoke detectors in high-risk, low income & seniors' homes. Call 602-261-8675

**Fire Cadets** – After training, cadets provide assistance in fire stations and all other areas of the Fire Department. Call 602-534-4488

**Crisis Intervention** – Provides services to Fire and Police departments, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Staffed by mental health and emergency technician volunteers. Call 602-534-9244

**Human Services Department** – Individual and group opportunities vary by site and/or program. Volunteers assist in our senior centers, Head Start classrooms, homeless programs and various community initiatives. Call 602-262-6667

**Parks and Recreation Department** – Numerous volunteer opportunities are available city-wide including at community and multigenerational centers, parks, swimming pools and mountain preserves. Call 602-261-8606

**Phoenix Mountain Parks and Preserves** – On-going volunteer programs ranging from light clean-up work to strenuous trail building and restoration are available for all age groups. Call 602-534-6522

**Police Department:**

**Citizens Offering Police Support (C.O.P.S.)** – is the volunteer force of the Phoenix Police Department under the direction of the Police Employment Services Bureau, it plays an important part in our city’s police operations. C.O.P.S. volunteers work side-by-side with sworn officers in almost every aspect of law enforcement. Some opportunities open to C.O.P.S. volunteers include: motorist assist patrol, data entry aide, alarm section clerk, crime analyst assistant, family/liaison program assistant, community action program assistant, missing persons case coordinator, mounted horse detail and police academy/range assistant. All applicants will complete a background questionnaire, an interview with a police background investigator, and have a polygraph examination. C.O.P.S. is open to anyone who wants to lend a hand, learn new skills and make new friends. Call 602-262-4083

**Citizen Police Academy** - Since April 1986, the Phoenix Police Department’s Citizen Police Academy has provided business and community leaders an inside look at law enforcement. Students tour the crime lab, participate in firearm demonstrations, and are introduced to the K-9 Units, Special Assignment Unit, and participate in a tour of a precinct. Other class topics include police ethics, discipline policy/philosophy, radio communications, drug enforcement, gang enforcement, traffic laws and DUI.

Police executives and veteran officers teach academy classes. Students have the opportunity to meet the Chief of Police, and are encouraged to ask questions and express their concerns. The Phoenix Police Department hopes there will be a greater awareness and understanding of law enforcement’s role in the community through the education provided by the Citizen Police Academy. ## Village Planning Committees

Village Planning Committees assist the Planning Commission to:

- Identify areas or provisions to the General Plan that need refinement and updating
- Identify problems and needs related to implementing the General Plan
- Define future purpose, density and character of sub-areas of the villages; and comment on proposals for new zoning or land use districts
