#### **Popular Phoenix Trails to Close During Extremely Hot Days**

Three popular City of Phoenix hiking trails will close during extremely hot days.

On days when the National Weather Service issues an Excessive Heat Warning, Camelback Mountain's Echo and Cholla Trails and all trails associated with Piestewa Peak Trailhead in the Phoenix Mountains Preserve will close from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

During Excessive Heat Warnings, trail access is limited, parking lot gates will be closed, and signage will be posted. Closure information will be posted on the Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department's website and social media accounts, and to local resorts and hotels. Additionally, Phoenix Park Rangers will be visible at those locations to remind and educate trail users about the restrictions. Email notifications are also available by signing up for "Hiking and Heat Updates" online.



#### City Pools and Swim Lesson Information for Summer 2024

The Parks department will open 16 pools all season long and an additional two pools, one in June and one in July, for a total of 18 pools this summer.

Pools open for the entire season: Coronado, Cortez, Deer Valley, El Prado, Encanto, Falcon, Harmon, Madison, Maryvale, Paradise Valley, Pecos, Perry, Roosevelt, Starlight, Sunnyslope, Washington pools. These pools will be open May 25-27, June 1-July 28 (closed Fridays).

Select pools open for extended season include Cortez, Encanto, Maryvale, Paradise Valley, Pecos, Perry, Roosevelt, Sunnyslope pools. These 8 pools will be open weekends through Labor Day. Open dates are August 3-4, 10-11, 17-18, 24-25 and August 31 - September 2.



#### **North Mountain Playground Closure**

The North Mountain Playground has safety concerns that include:

- Completely sheared off/missing nuts and bolts that hold the structures together.
- Sharp exposed edges throughout where the protective covering on the metal has worn off, leaving bare metal.
- Compromised surface decking throughout.

For the safety of the public, the playground equipment has been removed. However, the swings have been left in place to be enjoyed by the public. To enjoy a playground near you, please visit one of our nearby parks: Norton, Palma and Mountain View Parks.

The timeline of anticipated construction of the park renovations is estimated as:

- Design April 2024 to March 2025
- Construction Late spring 2025 to early summer 2026

#### Fire Ban in Desert Parks and Preserves Starts May 1

The Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department will put into effect its annual ban of open fires in the City's desert parks and mountain preserves starting Wednesday, May 1, 2024. The Maricopa County Parks and Recreation Department's annual fire ban goes into effect the same day.

In consultation with the Phoenix Fire Department, smoking and charcoal fires are included in the ban due to the extreme fire danger that the combination of low humidity, increased temperatures, excessive dry vegetation, and frequent high winds create each spring.

The ban applies to Camelback Mountain, Deem Hills Recreation Area, Lookout Mountain, Papago Park, Phoenix Mountains Park and Recreation Area, Phoenix Mountains Preserve, Phoenix Sonoran Preserve, North Mountain Park, Rio Salado Habitat Restoration Area, and South Mountain Park/Preserve.


#### Phoenix Awarded \$1.2 Million for Phoenix Light Rail

The City of Phoenix was awarded a Transit Oriented Development (TOD) grant of \$1,200,000 from the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Transit Administration to help with efforts to improve access to public transit and create a transit oriented walkable, livable, and sustainable community.

Accessible public transit is critical to the economic health and growth of our City's communities. After the completion of the South Central Downtown Hub light rail extension, scheduled for 2025, the existing light rail line - the Phoenix Light Rail Main Line - will become a multi-line system with the downtown Phoenix area serving as the center for system transfers. The FTA awards this TOD grant for Phoenix's Light Rail Main Line that includes the Reinvent PHX, 19North, downtown Phoenix and the 50th Street station areas.

- The TOD funds will be utilized with the following primary goals in mind:
- Evaluate current and projected growth and development.
- Assess affordable housing and development opportunities with emphasis on city-owned, vacant, and large development sites.
- Make recommendations to streamline permitting for rental housing and other community visions.
- Educate and engage community stakeholders on various transit-oriented development growth opportunities.
