## City maintains balanced budget, AAA credit rating

The city of Phoenix finished fiscal year 2010-11 with revenues right on target, expenses under budget and a AAA credit rating, the highest credit rating of the six largest cities in the United States.

"Despite one of the worst economic meltdowns in the history of the United States, Phoenix maintained the highest possible bond rating, which in turn, has saved taxpayers millions of dollars in interest expenses," said Mayor Phil Gordon.

Other highlights include using the city's AAA credit rating to refinance and restructure debt, for a savings of \$44.5 million; increasing the city's



contingency, or rainy day, fund to \$36 million, the highest level in the city's history; and earning a 95 percent approval rating from the public for city employees being "courteous and professional" when providing services to the community.

Sales tax collections continued to improve in 2010-11, with city retail sales increasing by 5.3 percent compared to 2009-10. And residents continued to pay lower Phoenix property taxes, decreasing by 41 percent when comparing 2009-10 to 2010-11. For more details, visit phoenix.gov.

## Holiday garbage/recycling pickup schedule

There's a special holiday collection schedule when a city holiday falls on a collection day. For example: Residents who normally have garbage or recyclables collection on Monday have collection on Tuesday. This moves Tuesday's collection to Wednesday.

## Brownfields planning meeting set for Sept. 27

A visioning workshop for the Del Rio Area Brownfields Planning Project will be at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 27, at the Rio Salado Audubon Center, 3131 S. Central Ave.

The workshop will present the results of the three prior workshops and provide residents with the opportunity to review the information and provide input. More community planning workshops will take place in early 2012.

The Del Rio brownfields project will create a brownfields area plan that will help guide the redevelopment of brownfield sites within the area, inform the assessment and cleanup of sites, and identify resources available to assist with redevelopment. The project area includes land between Seventh Avenue and 16th Street, from the Salt River south to Broadway Road.

The term "brownfields" is used to describe real estate that is contaminated or perceived to be contaminated by hazardous substances or petroleum in soil or groundwater.

### Acceptable HHW Materials at Collection Events

- Automobile fluids – antifreeze; oil; gasoline; diesel fuel; additives; degreasers
- Oil-based paints and related materials (10 gallon maximum) – varnish; turpentine; linseed oil; adhesives
- Pesticides; herbicides; insecticides
- Pool chemicals
- Propane tanks – grill or camp size only
- Car – lead acid batteries
- Car tires – only five (5) per household. NO OVER SIZED TIRES. Rims OK
- Large appliances – refrigerators; freezers; stove; dishwasher; washer; dryer
- Air conditioner; heat pumps; water heaters; evaporative coolers
- Electronics – computers; printers; televisions; stereos; DVD players

## Save trees by recycling paper products

**Y**ou can now recycle many types of paper products, including beer/soda carriers, detergent boxes, frozen food boxes and shredded paper (in a clear plastic bag).

As always, you can still toss into the blue barrel newspapers, magazines (including the staples), catalogs, junk mail, cards, envelopes, food boxes, milk cartons and juice boxes, clean pizza boxes, cardboard, paper bags and telephone books.

To keep the Phoenix recycling program running smoothly please do not recycle photos, original blue prints and hardcover books (donate these to your favorite charity).

Roughly 75 percent of recycle materials collected by the city of Phoenix are paper related. Paper materials recovered from blue barrels are sold all over the world for processing into more paper or paperboard. Some materials are recycled at paper mills right here in Arizona. ## Don't forget to bag and tie garbage and grass clippings

**T**o make sure your garbage container is collected, please bag and securely tie garbage and grass and place in your curbside container. Remember:

- Curbside containers must be placed at the front of the curb by 5:30 a.m. collection days and removed from the curb by 5:30 a.m. the day after collection.
- Curbside containers must not be blocked. Place container handles to face the residence. Lids must be closed.
- Do not place or stack any material around or on top of containers. Material not in a container will not be collected.

## Yellow pages: opt out or go green

**T**he yellow pages are great, if you use them. But if you've made the transition to an online directory, you can stop delivery of the phone book to your home or business. 

## BULK TRASH CREWS DO NOT PICK UP...

- More than 20 cubic yards per residence, or a pile the size of an SUV.
- Loose debris and litter. Please sweep or rake after collection if necessary.
- Loose grass, leaves, weeds, twigs and hedge clippings. It must be bagged or boxed and securely tied to be collected.
- Household hazardous waste (HHW), such as antifreeze, pool chemicals, oil, batteries and paint. See the HHW section for proper disposal.
- Community piles
- Materials such as bricks, concrete, dirt, rocks, asphalt and roofing shingles/tiles.
- Construction materials in excess of 25 lbs. or over 4 feet long generated by a residence.
- Any construction material generated by a contractor.
- Metal or car parts in excess of 20 lbs. or over 4 feet long.
- Any type or size of tire.
- Glass such as windows, shower doors, patio doors, mirrors, fluorescent tubes.
- Appliances that use refrigerants such as freezers, refrigerators, and air conditioners.

### TO USE THIS SCHEDULE

- Locate your numbered area on the map.
- Find the area number on the schedule.
- Bulk trash must be placed out by 6 a.m. on the "Collection Begins On" date.
- Placement is allowed only between your area's listed dates.

### ONE WEEK RULE

City ordinance allows only nine days prior to the scheduled collection week to place bulk trash out for collection. It is a violation of city ordinance to place bulk trash out before the listed "Placement Begins On" date.


## Applications accepted for Electric Light Parade
