## **Employees invited to 'Paint Phoenix Purple' kickoff**

Mayor Greg Stanton and City Council are launching the second annual "Paint Phoenix Purple" awareness campaign at 8 a.m. Oct. 2 at the City Hall atrium to increase community awareness about the need to end domestic violence.

Employees can get domestic-violence information and resources from 8 to 11 a.m. in the atrium from various agencies and can purchase/order purple golf shirts with the "Paint Phoenix Purple" logo. The shirts are \$25 and can be worn throughout the month of October.

City departments are helping to raise awareness about the need to end domestic violence by installing purple lights on Tovrea Castle at Carraro Heights; turning the lights purple at the top of City Hall; making the lighting crystals purple on Third Street between Washington and Monroe streets at the Phoenix Convention Center; installing purple lights on trees along Washington Street downtown; installing "Paint Phoenix Purple" posters on city garbage trucks; and placing 'Paint Phoenix Purple' magnets on city vehicles.

City employees and residents are encouraged to show support for the campaign with their own displays of purple, such as installing a purple light bulb on a porch, wearing purple on Fridays, tying a purple ribbon on their car antennas, etc.

Displaying purple throughout the community sends a strong message that there is no place for domestic violence in our homes, neighborhoods, schools or workplaces.

## **City projects win 10 Arizona Forward Environmental Awards**

City officials proudly accepted four first-place Crescordias and six Awards of Merit at the 34<sup>th</sup> annual Arizona Forward Environmental Excellence Awards ceremony Saturday. The competition, which received nearly 100 entries, is Arizona's oldest and most prestigious awards competition focusing exclusively on sustainability.

The following projects received Crescordia awards:

- Faye Gray Recreation Center (Parks and Recreation) The center's environmental features include passive solar design, local construction materials, catchment areas for rainwater runoff and roof overhangs for shade.
- Complete Streets Ordinances (Street Transportation) The City Council-approved policy encourages people to walk, bike or use mass transit whenever possible. Complete Streets principles are integrated into all community planning.

- Transit 2000: The Phoenix Transit Plan (Public Transit) The plan has moved Phoenix from the 34<sup>th</sup> largest transit system in the nation to 28<sup>th</sup> and has paved the way for an influx of sustainable public and private transit-oriented development.
- Ground Cover Public Art Project (Phoenix Office of Arts and Culture) The project involved hundreds of craftspeople and artists who donated their time and talent to produce 300 individual handmade blankets that were assembled into a monumental art installation. The individual blankets later were distributed to the homeless.
